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



Happy Birthday, Cheyenne Regional Medical Center! It's been 150 years since our "Magic City of the Plains" was founded here along the banks of Crow Creek! When the Union Pacific Railroad arrived, they pitched a number of tents, including a hospital tent for their workers. Over the next few years, "community healthcare" developed and thrived in this new frontier city. In 1882, a fundraising campaign was started for a new hospital. The land that would eventually become the corner of 23rd Street and Evans Avenue was donated by the Union Pacific Railroad and through the generosity of the Chevenne community, the first patients were admitted on December 7th, 1883.

Cheyenne has a long history of generous community support for our healthcare programs and in 1977 a new organization was organized to harness that generosity: the Laramie County Memorial Hospital Foundation! The initial Board of Directors showed the need for integrated work between the hospital and the community, requiring two members of the hospital Board of Trustees, the hospital Administrator and President of the Medical Staff, and

three other residents of Laramie County. Today, 40 years later, our Foundation still follows that model and Board members include two hospital Trustees and the CEO, two medical representatives, and a dynamic group of dedicated volunteer board members from across Laramie County.

Since that first fundraising campaign in 1882, our Foundation and our community hospital have been blessed with a strong, vibrant donor base that supports all facets of care being provided by Cheyenne Regional.

Thank you to everyone who supported Cheyenne Regional and the amazing care provided to our community. Whether your support took the form of a single monetary donation or a recurring gift, all are greatly appreciated and have a significant impact. Equally important are those who support through a gift of their precious time. DAUGHTER'S BIRTH INSPIRED PAST CHAIR TO VOLUNTEER

While many families support Cheyenne Regional, the Rose family has taken its service to the hospital to the next level. That support starts with Carmalee Rose who sits on the Cheyenne Regional Foundation Board of Directors. Daughter, Carli Rose, is an OB Tech on the Mother-Baby Unit. Carmalee's daughter-in-law, Jennifer Kamarad is a registered nurse on the hospital's pediatric floor, while Carmalee's son, Caleb is an engineer for the Cheyenne Fire Department after spending a part of his career working in Cheyenne Regional's Emergency Department. Her husband, Mauri, also worked for the Fire Department as an Engineer.

"Between the men being first responders and the women working at the hospital I think it shows we all care about our hospital and keeping it here," says Carmalee.

Rose is ending her two-year term as chair of the Cheyenne Regional Foundation Board of Directors. It was a period that saw the Foundation gain a new executive director, Scott Fox, and a combined effort to harmonize the work of the Foundation and hospital.

"Our strategic plan and mission now agree with each other," Rose says. "I really think it focuses on community education and engagement."

The relationship between the Rose family and the hospital began nearly 30 years ago with the birth of Carmalee's daughter-

"an amazing experience." Ever since that day, Rose said it was important to find a way to give back to the hospital. One way they found to "give back" was to have their family featured in an advertisement for the OB unit! Seven years ago, a vacancy on the Foundation board presented a new opportunity."

"I wanted to be a part of the hospital in some way because I came from a small farming community in Nebraska that lost its hospital because everyone went somewhere else," Rose says. "I wanted to do something in return to make sure we have the best equipment and excellent doctors."

Rose served a two-year term as director, which is not the norm at the Cheyenne Regional Foundation. However, it was

n January 11, Cheyenne Regional Medical Center celebrated with hundreds of employees, medical providers and community members. "Hosting this celebration allowed us to recognize those who have come before us. It also helped celebrate the great advances we've made as a healthcare system to help care for our community and region," said Hillary Hardy, Cheyenne Regional marketing and communications manager. A photo timeline exhibited at the event is currently featured between the hospital's main lobby and emergency department.



Planned anniversary-related activities include an outreach to the community focused on 150 days of giving, to be coordinated by the hospital's Foundation. Hospital employees will also participate in several run/walk events to benefit other organizations, such as the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life and the local Alzheimer's Walk.

FROM TENT HOSPITAL TO STATE-OF-THE-ART FACILITY

The railroad played a pivotal part in the establishment of Cheyenne and the care of its people. In 1867 the Union Pacific Railroad set up a tent near what is now the corner of 15th Street and Capitol Avenue to treat workers who were injured during the building of the transcontinental railroad. The following year the City

of Cheyenne bought the frontier tent hospital. In 1870, the hospital, jointly managed by the city and county, relocated to the Dodge House. In 1883, a new building was constructed on land donated by the Union Pacific Railroad, an area to eventually become 23rd Street and Evans Avenue.

By 1900, the hospital was renamed St. John's Hospital. The railroad continued to participate in Cheyenne's healthcare the following century, funding the construction of an addition in 1911 for the care of Union Pacific employees and their dependents. In 1922 a new county hospital was completed and christened Frances Warren Pershing Memorial Hospital. The building was remodeled in 1949 with a new addition and modernization of the

operating room, newborn nursery, and business office.

In 1952 the Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth opened DePaul Hospital, adding to healthcare in Cheyenne.

More renovations took place at Memorial Hospital during the 1960s, including the construction of an East Tower in 1960 and a seven-story West Tower eight years later. In 1961, the Memorial Hospital Auxiliary was established.

In 1985 a Radiation Therapy Complex was completed. The following year another remodel took place with the fourth floor of the East Tower developed as an inpatient psychiatric treatment unit for adolescents and adults.

During the early 1990s, Memorial Hospital of Laramie County purchased DePaul Hospital for \$12.65 million, creating United Medical Center and forming two campuses: UMC-West and UMC-East. Later that decade, the hospital began providing emergency services for F.E. Warren Air Force Base, opened Home Away From Home at UMC-East with help from the UMC Auxiliary, and opened The Women's Imaging Center as well as a multilevel parking facility at UMC-West.

The next decade brought more changes, including a new patient tower. The hospital was renamed Cheyenne Regional Medical Center in 2006. The Davis Hospice Center opened that year as well.

More advancements in patient care have taken place since, including a new cardiac electrophysiology lab for the treatment of heart conditions, a new Emergency Department, the Wyoming PACE (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly), and a state-of-the-art Cancer Center. In 2012, Cheyenne Regional received the National Hospital Charitable Award, one of 10 health-care systems in the nation to obtain this recognition. The past two years saw additional milestones in community health care, including the offering of MAKO, a surgeon-controlled robotic surgical system for orthopedic procedures (the only one in Wyoming); the formation of a care alliance with Children's Hospital Colorado; and a joint venture to operate the Cheyenne Women's Imaging Pavilion.

HOSPITAL FOUNDATION TURNS 40

Many of these advancements have taken place in conjunction with the hospital's Foundation.

First established in 1977 as Laramie County Memorial Hospital Foundation, the organization provides grants, donations, and volunteer service.

Since its inception 40 years ago, the Foundation, through its donors, events, and volunteers, has raised more than \$40 million for the hospital, with significant support for construction of the Davis Hospice Center and the Cancer Center.

"We are Cheyenne's foundation for their community hospital, championing support and investments made for the betterment of health and well-being of our community," said Wendy Fanning, Director of Annual Giving and Grants.

The Foundation gives about \$400,000 per year to the hospital through grants and other funds raised, often focusing on a specific program. This year's attention is the hospital's anniversary and the PACE program, Fanning said.

"We're really excited about this program," she said. "It enables the aging population to live with dignity within their community."

The future looks bright for strong community health care.

"With the latest development of our care alliances as well as a focus on the PACE program and other aging services, Cheyenne Regional is set to continue its excellent health care for another 150 years," Hardy said. **

Changes Coming to Cheyenne Regional Fundraising

Walk through Little America any weekend night of the year and there's a decent chance you'll find one of Cheyenne's numerous nonprofits holding a gala-type dinner with silent auction. For years, Cheyenne Regional's Denim 'N Diamonds event has been the cream of Cheyenne's gala crop, evolving the past two years into a suitcase party, which attracted 600 attendees last year.

A Cheyenne Regional Foundation Board meeting in December posed two questions: Is the gala model growing stale? Is there a better way to engage a young professional who may struggle to find the time and cash involved to attend a gala? The decision was made to not hold Denim 'N Diamonds in 2017, and instead, concentrate on a few smaller events done over the year.

"The effort on Denim 'N Diamonds, particularly over the last three years has been significant," said Dr. Bud Davis, the Foundation Board Chair. "When you look at all of the nonprofits in Cheyenne and what they are doing, they are all doing essentially the same thing. We don't want to be also-rans, we want to be leaders."

While Davis and Scott Fox, the Executive Director of the Cheyenne Regional Foundation, both stress it's possible that Denim 'N Diamonds could return in 2018, the Foundation is using its 150th anniversary celebration year to try some new fundraising efforts. Among them is an event set for June 10, where the hospital will partner with Union Pacific (a reminder of Cheyenne Regional's roots as a Union Pacific hospital tent) for a fundraiser and Golden Spike ceremony.

The Foundation Board made another decision during its December meeting as well: to set a fundraising goal of \$270,000 to help the Wyoming PACE (Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly) program with its planned expansion to a new facility.

The Foundation is considering a number of other ideas spanning from online crowdsourcing efforts to other events aimed at a younger professional audience. Davis says the Foundation is attempting outreach to this audience to explain the importance of a community hospital and the financial need that entails. Fox hopes that will lead to greater engagement and support.

"That's something great about this generation—they really want to get out there and get involved," Fox said. "We want to bring them on and start to build their support for the community hospital and local healthcare." *

PLAYROOM PROVIDES SAFE SPACE FOR CHILDREN

The Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) program at the hospital recently received grant funds for a playroom to help children feel more comfortable.

The SANE program at Cheyenne Regional Medical Center provides specialized care to patients of all ages who have been a victim of sexual violence, collects evidence, and provides preventative medications.

"When someone experiences sexual assault, the event is traumatizing, and they need to have a specially trained person who can help begin healing," said Chere Bohr, the Forensic Nursing Program Manager who oversees the program. "This comforting area will help enhance these services."

For children receiving care, playing gives them the opportunity to relax and have some distraction, as well as to allow the nurses to build trust before the examination. When children come with a parent who is seeking care, they have a safe place to play, allowing the parent to have the ability to relax and allow the nurses to care for them.

Bohr added, "The grant has given our program the ability to increase the comfort and healing provided to all those we serve. We are thankful for the Foundation's grant." *

Peter Pan Makes Surprise Visit to Hospital

Once in a while, magic happens.

It manifests itself in the smiles and laughter of patients who would rather be anywhere else, but find themselves in the hospital during the holidays.

On December 19, those smiles and laughter were delivered by Captain Hook and Peter Pan—or at least by the dancers portraying the characters in *Ballet Wyoming's* production. The performers visited the hospital's PACE daytime care program for seniors, as well as the rest of the hospital. They came in costume, talked to the patients, and even performed a short scene, complete with dancing and sword fighting.

The visit was one of the ways the hospital strives to improve the patient experience—and that experience is a priority, said Wendy Fanning, Cheyenne Regional Foundation's Director of Annual Giving. "Bringing a little bit of joy is a beautiful thing," she said. *

Receiving grant funds to purchase a specialized life-saving cardiopulmonary ventilator, Cheyenne Regional will be able to treat more premature babies instead of sending them to Denver hospitals. Staying in Cheyenne means a world of difference for both the preemies and their families.

"We are so grateful for this grant that allows us to offer our patients quality care that utilizes this specialized equipment," said Suzanne Townsend, Director of Cardiopulmonary, Neuro Diagnostics, EKG Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehab Services at the hospital.

A ventilator is a life-saving device that breathes for a patient or, in some cases, assists in breathing for a patient. The hospital used a portion of a recent grant, about \$67,700, to buy a V500 Draeger ventilator, which has specialty modes optimal for ventilation, giving options to care for very premature or ill infants.

Townsend explained that the hospital has been fortunate to receive previous grants through the Cheyenne Regional Foundation in the last few years. "This grant money has provided us with equipment such as the intrapulmonary percussive ventilator, which helps with airway clearance and also a noninvasive ventilator." **

Partnership Brings Quality Breast Imaging Services

Cheyenne Radiology and Cheyenne Regional Medical Center partnered last summer to increase women's access to quality care.

"One of our big goals is to improve the rate at which women are getting screened for breast cancer," Dr. Eric Hoyer, medical director of Cheyenne Women's Imaging Pavilion said.

About one in eight women get breast cancer, said Dr. Hoyer. The number of Wyoming women seeking mammogram screenings is lower than the national average: 50 to 60 percent versus 70 percent.

"It started with the idea that we could join forces, in particular in the realm of breast imaging, and bring our capabilities together to create a breast imaging center that is more functional...and therefore able to provide the highest quality imaging service for women throughout the region," said Dr. Hoyer. "The partnership has been several years in the making. It's the culmination of a vision. So far, it's been a big success."

Previously a service line within Cheyenne Radiology, the Cheyenne Women's Imaging Pavilion began operating as a joint venture in July 2016 and offers mammogram screenings, bone density tests, diagnostic ultrasounds, and stereotactic breast biopsies. The staff conducts about 50 exams daily.

"We've worked well together for many years," said Dan Canales, Cheyenne Regional's Medical Imaging Director. "Technology in the medical imaging field is constantly changing. It's good to have a partner that understands the importance of staying on the cutting edge with equipment and having a well-trained staff to provide the best care for every patient. Everyone is committed to making this an imaging center of excellence for our patients and the community."

That excellence will soon be recognized, as the Cheyenne Women's Imaging Pavilion begins to reach toward achieving the highest designation for a women's imaging center: a Breast Imaging Center of Excellence by the American College of Radiation. While the designation would be an honor, it's also a reflection of what patients at the Women's Imaging Pavilion already know: when healthcare providers join forces, the whole community benefits.

Robot-assisted Surgery Shortens Hospital Stays

Thanks to constant improvements from the basic to high-tech, the days of long hospital stays after a knee or hip replacement are long gone at Cheyenne Regional Medical Center.

The hospital acquired a Stryker Mako™ Robotic-Arm Assisted Surgery unit in 2015, and surgeons performed the first operation with it in May of that year. The addition of the Mako™ unit helped the orthopedics line staff achieve better patient care results than ever before in partial knee and total hip replacements. Now, in 2017, Chevenne Regional will offer the latest technology in Makoplasty Robotics-total knee replacements!

A CT scan is taken of the joint, and the Mako™ unit uses the scan to map out the exact areas of the bone that will be removed by the burr on the robotic arm.

"The Robotic System ensures optimal implant positioning, which results in a more natural feeling replacement." said Cheryl Crumpton, the Ortho/ Neurosurgery Service Line. That means the patient experiences a more precise fit with less pain and spends less time in the hospital after the surgery.

Hope Robinson, the Clinical Nurse Manager for Ortho/ Neurosurgery, said the entire hospital's staff has made a conscious effort to make the patient experience better and better for the past several years—and her claim has been validated by HealthGrades, who rated Cheyenne Regional as one of the top 100 hospitals for orthopedic surgery in 2016.

But the hospital isn't done improving. Robinson said the Foundation helped acquire hip chairs, which are specialty elevated chairs to assist in keeping proper body alignment and preventing damage to the new hip replacement.

Now, in 2017, Cheyenne Regional will offer the latest technology in Makoplasty Robotics-total knee replacements!

Another innovation is the addition of our Joint Care Navigator. "Kim Draper coordinates care through the entire process for patients going through a joint surgery," Crumpton said. "Patients attend Joint Camp education class where they learn about the procedure, exercises, and what they can expect after they get home." Additionally, the Joint Care Navigator is a life-line for patients after they leave the hospital.

"She does a home visit to make sure they'll be safe," Crumpton said. "She gives them her number, and she's their go-to person for questions they might have."

Efforts like that prove that Cheyenne Regional won't rest until the patient experience is perfect. *

GRANT PROVIDED LUNG CANCER SCREENINGS TO 125

More people die from lung cancer than any other cancer in the nation, according to the American Lung Association. Laramie County is considered a high-risk area partially due to a high number of smokers. Early detection of lung cancer with low-dose CT screenings has been life-saving for many Wyomingites—maybe even

someone you know.

In 2014, the Cheyenne
Regional Foundation
applied for and received
the Whedon Grant from the
Whedon Cancer Detection
Foundation, a nonprofit
organization in Sheridan. From 2014 to 2016,
the \$70,750 grant allowed 125 men and
women in the area to receive free to low-cost
CT lung cancer screenings. Thirty people
were diagnosed with nodules and 7 cancers
were discovered.

"We are so grateful that the Foundation took the initiative to write this grant that benefitted our community," said Barbara Lawyer, RN and Oncology Program Manager at Cheyenne Regional. **
